Our mission is to convene a network of neighbors, schools, businesses, social service agencies, faith communities, and other organizations to collaborate for thriving communities in Logan Square, Avondale, and Lathrop Homes. LSNA is committed to empowering and maintaining these communities as diverse, safe, and affordable neighborhoods in which to live and work, learn and grow.

Programs and Organizing

Community Learning Centers in five schools that stay open until 8 pm, serving students and their families with 60 academic and arts education programs (400 families);

110 Parent Mentors who work daily in school classrooms and 24 Parent Tutors reaching the students most atrisk academically, serving over 3,700 children;

Grow Your Own Teachers, a university partnership with 55 parents studying to be bilingual teachers and 20 certified teacher graduates (by December 2011);

Leadership opportunities and restorative justice practices at the high school level;

Health Outreach Team members who each year link more than 1,500 undeserved people to affordable, high quality health services;

A campaign to preserve the Chicago Housing Authority's Lathrop Homes as public and affordable housing through historic rehabilitation;

Working to secure financing and break ground for the Zapata Apartments, a new affordable rental and retail development slated to transform four parcels of vacant land into 66 rental units in Logan Square and create approximately 90 jobs;

A **Foreclosure Prevention Outreach Team** with demonstrable success, generating four times more homeowner calls to Cook County's new mediation program than zip codes without such outreach;

Immigration work centering on helping legal permanent residents become citizens.



Our work with elementary schools has been nationally recognized as a model both for integration of immigrant families into the broader society, as a model for parent involvement, and for school improvement, eg. (http://www.lsna.net/content/2/documents/83-102_education.pdf): Annenberg Institute's Voices in Urban Education Oct. 2009, "Parents Building Communities in Schools." Our health and wellness work in local elementary schools has also been recognized as a model by Chicago Public Schools. In 2010-2011, LSNA's housing work generated coverage in the *Chicago Sun-Times, Chicago Tribune*, on Chicago Public Radio, in *The Huffington Post*, and *La Raza*.



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LSNA's Impact:

- 42 institutional members
- 25 full-time and 4 part-time staff plus 110+ school-based employees (includes seasonal and part-time)
- 4,300 children/youth and approx. 400 adults served directly by LSNA's education programming
- 2,200 served through Housing and Family Stability, Health Outreach, and Immigration programming
- 1,000 volunteers engaged in programming and organizing; tens of thousands are impacted by LSNA's organizing work
- A Cord of Three Strands: A New Approach to Parent Engagement in Schools, a
 highly positive ethnography of LSNA's parent engagement work by
 Wellesley Professor Soo Hong, was published March 2011 by Harvard
 Education Press (http://www.hepg.org/hep/book/136/
 ACordOfThreeStrands).
- Also published March 2011, Grow Your Own Teachers: Grassroots Change for Teacher Education is an analysis of the development of LSNA's Grow Your Own (GYO) program and its transformation into a statewide and state-funded initiative with 16 sites and 500 teacher candidates.
- The average state achievement (ISAT) *meet or exceed test scores* at 7 partner schools with LSNA education programs *increased from 43.7% in 2004 to 64.7% in 2010*.
- LSNA is a member of a coalition that has assisted 50,000 legal permanent residents in becoming U.S. citizens since 2005.
- Successful Parent Mentor programs based on LSNA's model were developed in Chicago's southwest side, far northside, and suburban Aurora. LSNA also trained out-of-state organizations on this model in New Hampshire, Maryland, and Mississippi, and as far away as Denmark.

Selected Awards and Recognitions

October 2010: LSNA's application to the federal Promise Neighborhoods initiative was ranked highest in Illinois (no Illinois proposal was funded).

February 2010: The Illinois House of Representatives passed House Resolution No. 925 to "honor Nancy Aardema, Executive Director of the Logan Square Neighborhood Association (LSNA) in Chicago, for her twenty years of service to LSNA."

December 2009: Annenberg Institute for School Reform listed LSNA as one of 12 examples of "Communities Building Smart Education Systems."

December 2009: LSNA's Active Living Logan Square Partnership was covered by the *American Journal of Preventive Medicine*.

October 2009: LSNA's Monroe Community Learning Center won the Dimon Distinguished Community Schools Award.




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

Expenses




Total Expenses: \$3,095,032
