WE BELIEVE:

- We are the bridge between our communities and our schools.
- We create trust and unity by building strong lines of solidarity that allow us to organize.
- We provide a sacred space for Black and Brown parents to build their leadership and self confidence by building solidarity with one another.
- We are transforming our life, our school, our community.



WE ARE:

- Determined to continue planting the seed for parent leaders to grow by nurturing their skills, talents, and gifts.
- Committed to celebrate humanity by extending mutual support across our community impacting the quality of life and acting as an agent of change to find leadership within themselves.



WE LEARNED:

- To explore every alternative to find resources and services to our communities.
- That by working as a collective we grow our social and economic capital.
- To impact our children's education by reimagining remote learning, sharing our personal histories, and reflecting on learning life-long skills.
- To build stronger relationships with teachers, students, parents, staff, and community by engaging in virtual actions and events promoting social distancing, mutual aid, and academic and tech support.

Parent Mentor Program

We have learned to show courage under fire and an enormous sense not only of self-preservation or survival but instead it has been a great opportunity to show the power of being surrounded by Community. Therefore, through the Parent Mentor Program, we will continue building the world that we want to live. We will be planted but we can never be buried.

WE WILL:

- Continue advocating for education, equitable funds, resources for our schools.
- Protect and strengthen our communities by creating Palenques that provide liberation and integration, allowing us to bloom with honor while guiding with love.

WE WILL:

- Take the lessons from the last year into the future that sometimes to heal, feeling pain and hurt is inevitable. We need to change the narrative in order to heal.
- Continue organizing to demand the resources and services needed for us to thrive instead of survive. Therefore, we will be extending our Palenques and quilombos to our schools to organize, thus we can humanize social-emotional and academic support for a better future.

WE BELIEVE that what we do is NOT more important than how we do it. Scaling up does not need to mean repeating patterns of oppression or bureaucratic behaviors. We believe Black, Brown, and immigrant parents determine the future of their own lives and their families, schools, and communities.

WE ARE committed to making the Parent Mentor Program public policy - a publicly funded and community-driven universal part of public education.

WE HAVE LEARNED AND AFFIRMED THAT:

- Mutual aid is our way of being.
- Our dreams of going universal are more achievable than we thought, and we don't have to sacrifice our values, philosophy, training, and relationships to grow.
- Technology has allowed Parent Mentors and staff around the state to feel *more* connected to the whole than before.
- We can adapt Google Classroom, Zoom, electronic surveys, simultaneous translation, and more.



WE WILL:

- Continue to expand the Parent Mentor Program to more organizations and schools throughout the city, state, and country.
- Go deeper in the schools we are in through Pro-Black Pro-Healing Histories We've Never Been Told; Healing and Restorative Cultures, Culturally Relevant Tutoring Techniques through TIPTOP, and Organizing Beyond the Classroom.

Racial Healing is a matter of Public Policy: Schurz Sustainable Community Schools (SCS)

WE BELIEVE that schools are a community space for TRANSFORMATIVE education where:

- youth/ parents/ guardians are welcomed for their wisdom and are seen as co-creators in building this learning space
- curriculum is relevant to and representative of our students and their families/communities
- learning is pleasurable and freeing/decolonizing and healing centered



WE HAVE LEARNED

- critical connections over critical mass
- loss due to COVID over loss of learning
- integration over isolation

What's in our future?

We WILL:

- Build the Student Voice Committee and build Black and Brown solidarity at Schurz
- Ensure that Restorative Justice practices are daily tools available to teachers and students
- Support our students through our Parents in Action and emphasize their importance in our community, particularly through the student-driven clubs and mini grants
- Push for transparency and shared leadership, especially making sure that young people are in decision-making process from its inception

Racial Healing is a matter of Public Policy: McAuliffe and Mozart Community Learning Centers (CLCs)

We BELIEVE that CLCs:


- are spaces (open from mornings evenings) where students and parents feel loved and cared for, where they know they are both physically safe and emotionally safe to express themselves and feel heard
- provide opportunities for parents and any adult in the community to learn new languages and skills, and provide pathways for meaningful jobs/careers
- -engage students in civic learning so they understand the value of giving back to their communities

WE HAVE LEARNED

- trusting relationships (i.e. w/ teachers and administration) built successful remote programming
- remote programming for entire families resulted in more retention

We WILL:

- Continue to **collaborate** with schools to bring programs that enrich the lives of students and parents
- Ensure that trauma-informed care and SEL is a
 - central focus of our programs for both students *and* parents
 - Continue to utilize technology to build even stronger relationships with students and families, and amplify our labor of love



Racial Healing is a matter of Public Policy: Youth Leadership Institute

WE BELIEVE that liberation happens when narratives written by us replace the assumptions placed on us.

WE HAVE LEARNED how to grieve the loss of our brothers and sisters, and learned how to find healing in our collective action against the racial injustices/discrimination that took their lives.

As we look out into the future, WE WILL:

- Reclaim our narratives
- Show how we (youth) have been displaced/criminalized
- Begin to demand that funding goes toward our learning instead of the police/SROs



Racial Healing is a matter of Public Policy: Housing and Land Use

We believe all people, regardless of race or income, deserve the opportunity to succeed in school and in life, and this means having a stable home.

We've learned to build **power** by developing leaders, changing narratives, and taking action for racial equity in housing policy *through online digital organizing*.







WE ARE building power through community organizing and winning!

- There are 400+ affordable homes in the pipeline
- CDOT agreed to create La Placita in Logan Square
- Demolitions were banned for 14 months;
- Now there's a minimum density requirement
 + \$15k+ demolition impact fee in the
 Bloomingdale Trail area
- CHA is accepting ITIN#s in waitlist applications
- 20% units will be required to be set-aside in new large developments

In 2021 **we must** build power using a racial equity framework to plan for universal housing stability.

WE WILL:

- Secure affordable housing for mixed status families at 2525 N Kedzie in Ward 32 and continue our creation + preservation strategy overall
- Develop an equitable transitoriented land use plan with the help of Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning and Elevated Chicago
- Develop 60 leaders as part of Vision 60/60 for next year's Congress

WE BELIEVE in creating a Palenque where EVERYONE belongs.




WE ARE fighting for the liberation of our community; a liberation that results in everyone's full membership of society; true citizenship for all.

- These activities have informed our advocacy in the moment and into the future.



Advocate for policies and work that support our Palenque values:

- Continue to expand mutual aid for all businesses and community
- Continue to build on the Welcoming Corridor work in Hermosa
- State: Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), Illinois Way Forward legislation, Immigrant Services Line Item (ISLI), Defenders For All
- Federal: Citizenship for All campaign (ICIRR)
- Expand Department of Justice Accredited team to allow us to help more clients with citizenship, Green Card renewals, and DACA
